Ben remained in Mississippi, as did Mary, one of Laura's daughter. Descendants and relatives lived in Mississippi, Arkansas, Tennessee, North Carolina, South Carolina, Alabama, Indiana, Missouri and elsewhere. Includes some family history of the white slaveowners of the Wofford, Brinker and Lottie slaves.
