

[EPUB] La Sculpture Romane En Saintonge Limaginaire Et La Foi

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La sculpture romane en Saintonge-Jacques Lacoste 1998 intitulée "L'imaginaire et la foi. Saint-Eutrope de Saintes et la sculpture romane en Saintonge" s'est tenue à l'Abbaye-aux-Dames de Saintes de juillet à octobre 1996 à l'occasion de la commémoration du 9ème centenaire de l'église Saint-Eutrope de Saintes. Cet ouvrage est le prolongement naturel des recherches entreprises dans ce cadre. Il s'inscrit dans les actions menées par la Ville de Saintes et l'Atelier du Patrimoine de Saintonge au sein du réseau national des Villes et Pays d'Art et d'Histoire. C'est aussi le fruit d'un partenariat scientifique étroit avec le Centre Léo Drouyn de l'Université Michel de Montaigne/ Bordeaux III et son directeur Jacques Lacoste. Ce livre est avant tout un état des lieux, une mise en perspective des données concernant un ensemble artistique qui peut être considéré comme un des plus, riches d'Europe par la densité de sa production. La sculpture romane qui caractérise si fortement l'ancien diocèse médiéval de Saintes s'inscrit dans le contexte plus large des grands courants de création du Centre Ouest et du Sud Ouest, comme le rappellent les articles introductifs. Le grand chantier de l'église Saint-Eutrope de Saintes représente, à la fin du XIème, et au début du XIIème siècle, un des points d'ancrage majeurs de cet art " d'entre Loire et Garonne ". Plus d'une centaine de notices offrent aux chercheurs une approche monographique des monuments romans saintongeais qui présentent un intérêt du point de vue de leur décor sculpté, ainsi que l'ouverture de nombreuses pistes de recherche. Quant aux amateurs intéressés par le riche patrimoine roman de la Saintonge, ils utiliseront aisément cet ouvrage comme un guide de qualité qui leur fera découvrir des oeuvres connues avec un nouveau regard, tout en leur proposant de nouvelles découvertes hors des sentiers battus.

André Bazin's Film Theory-Angela Dalle Vacche 2019-11-28 Through metaphors and allusions to art, science, and religion, André Bazin's writings on the cinema explore a simple yet profound question: what is a human? For the famous French film critic, a human is simultaneously a rational animal and an irrational being. Bazin's idea of the cinema is a mind-machine where the ethical implications have priority over aesthetic issues. And in its ability to function as an art form for the masses, cinema is the only medium that can address an audience at the individual and community levels simultaneously-- the audience sees the same film, but each individual relates to the narrative in a different way. In principle, cinema can unsettle our routines in productive ways and expand our sense of belonging to a much larger picture. By arguing that this dissident Catholic's worldview is anti-anthropocentric, Angela Dalle Vacche concludes that André Bazin's idea of the cinema recapitulates the histories of biological evolution and modern technology inside our consciousness. Through the projection of recorded traces of the world onto a brain-like screen, the cinema can open viewers up to self-interrogation and empathy towards Otherness. Bazin was neither a spiritualist nor an animist or a pantheist, yet his film theory leads also to ideas of a more cosmological persuasion: through editing and camera movement, cinema explores our belonging to a vast universe that extends from the microbes of the microscope to the stars of the telescope. Such ideas of connectedness, coupled with Bazin's well-known emphasis of realism, form the foundation for his film theory's embrace of Italian neorealism. Choosing to avoid a quantitative naturalism based on

accumulation of details, Bazin's theory instead promotes the kind of cinema that celebrates perceptual displacement, the objectification of human behavior, and one's own critical self-awareness.

Romanesque Saints, Shrines, and Pilgrimage-John McNeill 2020-02-25 The 23 chapters in this volume explore the material culture of sanctity in Latin Europe and the Mediterranean between c. 1000 and c. 1220, with a focus on the ways in which saints and relics were enshrined, celebrated, and displayed. Reliquary cults were particularly important during the Romanesque period, both as a means of affirming or promoting identity and as a conduit for the divine. This book covers the geography of sainthood, the development of spaces for reliquary display, the distribution of saints across cities, the use of reliquaries to draw attention to the attributes, and the virtues or miracle-working character of particular saints. Individual essays range from case studies on Verona, Hildesheim, Trondheim and Limoges, the mausoleum of Lazarus at Autun, and the patronage of Mathilda of Canossa, to reflections on local pilgrimage, the deployment of saints as physical protectors, the use of imagery where possession of a saint was disputed, island sanctuaries, and the role of Templars and Hospitallers in the promotion of relics from the Holy Land. This book will serve historians and archaeologists studying the Romanesque period, and those interested in material culture and religious practice in Latin Europe and the Mediterranean c.1000-c.1220.
